“Palm/Passion Sunday”

This Sunday Christians celebrate Palm/Passion Sunday. We are remembering the last week of Jesus' life, especially the beginning of the week as he enters into Jerusalem, the center of religious and political life. (John 12:12-19). Jesus enters as a hero, as a celebrity, a triumphal king. The crowds are waving palm branches, which you would wave for a king and shouting out “Hosanna” which means “Save us.” Jesus turns out not to be quite who the crowds expected him to be and by the end of the week they are shouting “Crucify Him.”

Maybe this story is a bit like our lives. We want God/Jesus/ Somebody to save us, fix us, take away our problems and pain. We can get caught in the power of the crowd, celebrity worship, and unrealistic expectations. The Jesus that entered Jerusalem on a donkey rather than a prancing white stallion calls us to a life of humility, service, trust and faith. Jesus will save us but we need to walk with him, listen to what he asks of us and align our lives with his life of love and forgiveness. Here are some words of wisdom for Palm Sunday from Richard Cookson:

*Ready to join in loud acclamation the songs of praise, we wait for a new triumphal entry.
Eagerly expecting the new age to be announced with fanfare, we listen for trumpets.
Still, as of old, the truth comes clothed in humbleness and loving sacrifice.
Proclaim the coming not so much with shouts and branches but with lives given in love's humble service.*

Covid Updates

Westminster Village North is regulated by the Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH), Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and Centers for Medicare/Medicaid Services (CMS) as well as by the Governor office. As a community in Marion County, we must follow regulations for our county based on covid incidence rates. These organizations work together to create regulations for licensed nursing facilities that are different, more strict, than the rules in the general public. Please know that we have worked hard to fight the covid battle for our residents and their families, always with an eye on safety for those entrusted in our care. We understand that you may or may not agree with the way we translate the regulations into the licensed (AL and HC) and unlicensed (IL) areas of our community—but we hope that you understand it has all been done for resident safety.

Here are a few reminders of the current situation:

- Cottagers are able to come into Tamarack for activities and meals. At this time, there is still no in-home visitation, so we ask residents to depart after they have finished their business.
- Please remember that we are still placing orders in advance and eating in shifts in the Tamarack dining room. Cottagers will need to call in advance at ext. 1034. Meals cannot be served without advanced ordering. Menus are available on the tablet.
- Indoor visitation may be scheduled—but please be aware, this is not in-apartment visitation unless it is for compassionate care. Outdoor visitation is preferred when weather accommodates. Please contact Jackie Brewer at jbrewer@westminstervillage.com or

- Residents may leave the facility for up to 24 hours without having to quarantine. This means you are able to visit family or go out for a meal. There are no restrictions in IL, AL or the Health Center as to reason for the visit, but AL and HC residents must let the nurses know they will be leaving.
- Residents must wear masks when outside of their home, and must practice social distancing. We ask that you wash hands frequently as well.
- All guests must come to either the Tamarack main entrance (door #1) or to the Health Center administration door (door #11) to be screened before coming into the community. No guests should ever be admitted without having their temperature taken and answering the screening questionnaire. Please do not let strangers in side doors!!!

Severe Weather

This is a good time to go over the procedures during severe weather which could develop a tornado.

Differences in a tornado watch and warning:

Tornado watch means a tornado is possible in and near the watch area. Take early precautions and stay tuned to radio and television stations for information.
Tornado warning means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. Implement take-cover procedures immediately.

Every nurses' station on campus along with the Receptionist desk, Business Office area, Housekeeping and a few other areas are equipped with a NOAA weather radio. Once the radio is activated with a Tornado Warning and this warning includes the counties of Marion, Hancock, Hamilton and Madison Counties, the Village activates its Tornado procedures.

- Receptionist calls all the nurses' stations and notifies them we are in Tornado Warning and begin our procedures. Nurses' stations will be called again, once the warnings have expired.
 - H/C staff accounts for all residents and staff
 - Close all drapes in resident rooms, including drapes between beds
 - Those residents who may be in bed: staff covers the residents with blanket and lowers their bed
 - Residents who are up and can be moved: bring out into the halls to keep them away from windows and glass
 - Assisted living staff account for all residents and staff
 - Relocate residents to safe areas
 - Hallways away from doors and windows on the lowest floor
 - Basements are the best areas to stay safe
 - Rooms without windows such as a hallway
 - Instruct residents to stay in their bathrooms if they refuse to leave.
 - Independent Living and Cottage residents:
 - It is suggested that you have a NOAA weather alert radio (cottagers will be provided—call Jackie if you need one)
 - You can use the elevator to go to the basement. Stay away from glass doors and windows
 - Cottages take cover in your basement. If you do not have a basement, perhaps buddy up with a neighbor who has a basement or you may go the basement in one of the buildings
 - Or stay in a hallway or small interior area, such as a bathroom, Take a blanket and pillow to cover yourself and to protect your head
- During severe weather stay close to a radio and/tv for more information regarding severe weather

Staff have been trained on the risks associated with severe weather and tornadoes and know the procedures.

Garbage Etiquette

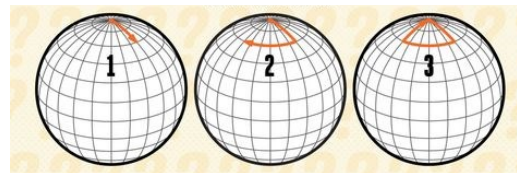
Please make sure prior to putting cups/bottles, etc. in any of the trash containers, you EMPTY THE LIQUIDS in your sink first.
